As we celebrate our 20th anniversary in 2024, we reflect on two decades of incredible growth and impact, sparked by the shared vision of Gail Wagner and Dan Ogola to provide accessible, quality healthcare in rural Kenya. We also launched a new era of growth for the partnership.

Tiba's third decade begins with a change in board leadership as Gail steps down from the presidency, while continuing as a board member leading our growing cervical and breast cancer initiatives. Bill Plautz, a retired ER and Lifestyle Medicine Physician, and a long-time board member, major donor, and volunteer for 14 years, has stepped up to the board's helm, with Rhiana

Expanding Surgical Services

We are excited to share that Dr. Walter Adero, Orthopedic Surgeon, has joined Matibabu and leads the development of the new FIGS Operating Theater. Dr. Walter's specialty is in orthopedics, and we are also developing specialties in breast and cervical cancer surgery. Our goal is that the FIGS Operating Theater will not only provide critical support for the local community but help develop specialty care for all of Western Kenya.

Rhiana's breast surgery camp in May focused on establishing relationships with Kisumu's breast specialists to bring about joint projects and training.

First Boda Girls Cohort Graduates and Now Serves as *Role Models*

In July, we celebrated the graduation of the first cohort of Boda Girls – women trained to drive motorcycle-taxis – with a special day at Lake Victoria. We call these courageous women the Boda Girls Founders because they were the first women in their community to ever ride a motorcycle. During the past two years, these young women have completed intensive training in 15 areas, including mentoring for a new Boda Girl. Each of the Boda Girls Founders has now paid for her own motorcycle and fully owns her taxi business. **They have increased their incomes from the \$1 a day the typical female worker earns, to \$7-10 a day.**

Moreover, these Boda Girls are now respected as women’s health advocates. Thanks to these women, the Boda Girls program continues to thrive, now welcoming its fifth cohort, for a total of **50 women**, each determined to transform their communities.

Matibabu College Celebrates a Decade of Developments and Commits to Grow

In September, Matibabu College of Health Sciences (MCHS) celebrated its 5th graduating class and **555 enrollees** since its founding in 2024. Accredited by the Nursing Council of Kenya, it is known as one of the top 5 nursing schools in the country, with **100% of its graduates passing the national nursing exam and finding employment within six months**. This year, Bridget Wylie and her Nursing Promise Ambassador Chapter donated iPads and loaded them with all of the required college textbooks, reducing student costs and saving trees.

The 2nd Annual STEM Camp at Lifunga Secondary School for Girls. For two weeks in July, Tiba volunteers co-taught STEM enrichment classes with the Kenyan teaching staff. Community Partners Recommends Scaling the *Boda Girls Program*

Tiba was awarded a grant from the Harvard Business Schools Community Partners (HBSCP) which conducted a four-month feasibility study about scaling the Boda Girls Program. HBSCP has enthusiastically endorsed the concept and submitted a plan to license/franchise the Program throughout rural communities across Kenya. The plan contemplates both vertical and horizontal scaling. For vertical scaling, the Boda Girls Program at Matibabu Hospital, now in its third year, will serve as an innovation lab, expanding the program to new activities.

Horizontal scaling will be implemented through joint ventures between Tiba and other established Kenyan organizations to institute the program in other communities – focusing on providing women access to healthcare and financial empowerment. A New Enterprise to Help *Sustain Matibabu*



For a host of reasons, Tiba is supporting construction of a mortuary adjacent to the Matibabu Hospital. In addition to serving as a venue for funerals – which are extremely important events in the local culture – the mortuary will provide support services to bereaved and needy families. The mortuary will also help financially sustain the hospital, and is required in order for the hospital to qualify as a Level-4 Hospital under Kenya law. The mortuary, featuring a unique chapel and outdoor garden, will open in October.
